

SU FORMA:

AFIRMATIVA	SUJETO + USED TO + INFINITIVO SIN EL TO
NEGATIVA	SUJETO + DIDN'T USE TO + INFINITIVO SIN EL TO
INTERROG.	DID + SUJETO + USE TO + INFINITIVO SIN EL TO?

- La forma USED TO va seguida de un infinitivo sin el TO se traduce por SOLÍA. O sea expresa un hábito en el pasado que ahora ya no tiene lugar:
When I was little my mother used to feed me.
Did you use to go to school when you were in the USA?
Bill didn't use to enjoy parties when he was younger.

USED TO

• PRESENT

AFIRMATIVA	SUJETO + GET/GETS USED TO + GERUNDIO
NEGATIVA	SUJETO + DON'T/DOESN'T GET USED TO + GERUNDIO
INTERROG.	DOES/DO + SUJETO + GET USED TO + GERUNDIO?

• PAST:

AFIRMATIVA	SUJETO + GOT USED TO + GERUNDIO
NEGATIVA	SUJETO + DIDN'T GET USED TO + GERUNDIO
INTERROG.	DID + SUJETO + GET USED TO + GERUNDIO?

- Utilizamos GET USED TO (acostumbrarse a) cuando hablamos sobre formar un hábito:
Bob got used to eating a big breakfast when he went to Australia.
(before that he only had coffee or breakfast)

GET USED TO

- **PRESENTE:**

AFIRMATIVA	SUJETO + AM/IS/ARE + USED TO + GERUNDIO
NEGATIVA	SUJETO + AM NOT/ISN'T/AREN'T USED TO + GERUNDIO
INTERROG.	AM/IS/ARE + SUJETO + USED TO + GERUNDIO?

- **PAST:**

AFIRMATIVA	SUJETO + WAS/WERE + USED TO + GERUNDIO
NEGATIVA	SUJETO + WASN'T/WEREN'T + USED TO + GERUNDIO
INTERROG.	WAS/WERE + SUJETO + USED TO + GERUNDIO?

- **TO BE PRESENT + USED TO + GERUNDIO / SUSTANTIVO**
(estar acostumbrado a) significa que tiene un hábito en este momento:
I'm used to waking up early.
I'm used to the noise in Mexico city.
- **TO BE PAST + USED TO + GERUNDIO / SUSTANTIVO** (estar acostumbrado a)
significa que tenía un hábito en el pasado:
Penny was used to eating paella when she lived in Spain.
John was used to good food when he lived in France.
